

#### What's the new ticketing system?

This year, Friends of Roxbourne Community are introducing a new unlimited ticketing system that allows access to ALL rides and games (excluding Dragons Den and Money Day stalls). We are also continuing with our traditional entry fee and pay per activity option.

#### FAQ'S/TERMS & CONDITIONS

#### Do I have to buy an unlimited ticket for my child?

NO - You can purchase an entry ticket and then pay per ride/game/activity, however the unlimited ticket option is much better value for money if your child goes on 3 rides or more. See table on previous page for rides/game/activities price breakdown.

#### Refunds/Exchanges

Refunds: please note this ticket is non-refundable.

**Exchange:** please note you will not be able to exchange your ticket from an entry only to unlimited ticket or vice versa. If you wish to do so, you will need to purchase a new ticket.

#### What about pupil premium?

A pupil premium advance child unlimited ticket option will be available via the school.

#### What is not included in the unlimited ticket?

All food & drink, Dragons Den and KS1/KS2 stall activities are to be paid for separately.

#### Can I have a go on the rides or activities with an adult entry ticket?

YES – There are a few adult friendly rides, however these will need to be paid for separately. See table on previous page for rides/game/activities price breakdown.

#### Do all children need to be accompanied by an adult?

Children age 12 and above can attend without an adult provided their parent or carer provides consent.

#### My year 6 child is taking part in Dragons Den. Do they need a ticket?

NO – year 6 children who are taking part in Dragons Den do not need to purchase a ticket. However, any other attending family members will require a ticket.

#### My year 6 child is NOT taking part in Dragons Den.

Do they need a ticket and does an adult need to accompany them?

YES – year 6 children who are NOT taking part in Dragons Den will need to purchase a ticket, and attend with an adult. All family members attending will require a ticket.

## Year Group Update

### **Nursery Update**

This week Nursery pupils have been practising for sports day and this has supported our physical development - spatial awareness, running, balancing, hopping etc.

In Literacy this week we have read one of our favourite stories called 'The Rainbow Fish' and we will be painting our own rainbow fish next week. Whilst reading the story we discussed the importance of sharing. In Art we have explored colour mixing and pupils are fascinated with this exploration. In Maths we have been learning about positional language and trying to use the correct vocabulary.

#### Sports Day

Monday 10th is sports day for Nursery pupils. Morning session will start at 10:30 and afternoon session will start at 14:30. We look forward to seeing all the parents and grandparents. Please apply sun cream on your child and send in a sun cap to keep them safe.

### **Reception Update**



In Literacy this week we changed things up a bit. Instead of reading a story to inspire our creativity we used our recent trip to the Ruislip Lido as our source of inspiration. Using photos from the day, we have made our own story of the trip and used the format of a recount to retell the events of the day. We have explored the features of a recount by looking at:

- 1. Time connectives First, Then, Next, After, Finally
- 2. Words to write sentences in past tense
- 3. Tricky common exception words
- 4. Actions to help us remember the recount order.

Next week we will write our own recount of our trip to the Ruislip Lido using what we have learned this week and photos to help us form our sentences.

In Maths, we got ready for Year 1 by exploring numbers beyond 20! First we explored the patterns of numbers and then we used 'Paint the Square' to count to 100. Confidences were running high so we also went all the way to 120. The children were very successful in using the pattern to count to 100 and beyond. We then looked at how to record the numbers in two digit form on our little white boards and rounded off the week by looking at the dienes blocks to see the numbers in concrete form.



In Topic this week, our travels across the world continued to the continents of Africa and South America. We sang the ever popular 7 Continents Song - <u>Click here for the song</u> and explored some videos of events, animals and places of interest in each continent. During Busy Learning, we made cone African animals and created our own Safari scene to help us explore the topic further.

#### **Graduation Ceremony**



A reminder that Wednesday 19th July is the Graduation Ceremony for the children in Reception. We have planned an exciting ceremony for you to see your children graduate from Early Years ready for their journey into the 'Big School' for their start in KS1. It promises to be a fantastic day and we would love to see you all there.

#### **Sports Day**

Monday 17th is sports day for all of Roxbourne Primary School. Reception and KS1 will be competing from 9:00 to 12:00 and it would be great to see the parents come and cheer their little competitors on!

### Y1 Update

This week in Maths, Year 1 has been learning about **capacity.** We were able to **compare** capacities by measuring in non-standard units. Year 1 has also been applying their knowledge of **halves** and **quarters** to capacity. In Writing this week, Year 1 has been looking at **poems**! We know the features of an **acrostic** poem and are able to make our own acrostic poems based on the seaside. We also were able to identify **similarities** and **differences** in acrostic poems, we know that poems can be different lengths and can be written by anyone.

In Science this week, Year 1 was able to find out what the main parts of a **tree** are. We know that all trees are plants, and just like other plants, trees have **roots**, **leaves** and a **stem**. We are able to identify the two different types of trees; **deciduous** and **evergreen**. We were also able to lead a leaf scavenger hunt, finding three different types of leaves. This week in History, Year 1 researched the question 'How have seaside holidays changed over time?'. Despite this, we know that seaside holidays today are **similar** and **different** to those in the past. Some of the **activities** we do today are the same as **Victorian** times, such as making **sandcastles** and **swimming** in the sea.

## Y2 Update

This week in Maths we consolidated our knowledge of capacity and volume. We experimented with different capacities and volumes to help us understand the concept of reading unit measurements. In Writing we have continued our poetry unit. We have been writing our own sonnets about a significant person in History.

In History we explored Martin Luther King's speech and analysed what he meant when he spoke passionately to the crowd. The children thought about what their dream might be in the future to help the world. In addition to this the children also matched Martin Luther King up to the 5'Rs to see if he was Historically significant. In Science we have continued observing our plants and writing about the changes that we can see over time.

Please continue to support your child at home with their reading and ensure they are filling out their reading records to the best of their ability. Homework must be completed and returned every Friday.

### **Y3 Update**

This week in Year 3 the children have been reading a range of short stories to recap important reading skills. One story was about The Ugly Duckling and the other was about Perseus and his quest, which is directly linked to our topic of Ancient Greeks in History. To develop our understanding of the story, we focused on the unfamiliar key vocabulary. As a class, we worked together to decipher their meanings and to read the sentences around the word to support us in doing so. The children then applied retrieval and inference skills to answer questions about the stories. It was very useful for the children to practise their reading skills and apply them to every text that they read.

In Writing this week, we have continued to look at poetry. We reviewed the purpose of writing a poem, which is to entertain by capturing the reader's interest. The children recapped the key features used in different types of poems with their partner. In groups, the children worked collaboratively to perform a poem called 'The Garden Gang'. There were some incredible and entertaining performances that used a range of gestures and movements and the children delegated roles responsibly!

In Maths, we have recapped the key topics that we have been learning about. In particular, we revised the different strategies that you could use to add and subtract, including mental strategies and the column written method. We also reviewed our previous knowledge on fractions and angles, such as finding a fraction of an amount and identifying the type of angle within a shape. The children also practised reading weighing scales with different intervals as part of our current unit.

In Science, we continued with our topic on Forces and Magnets. We first reviewed our previous learning on what a magnet is and where they originate from. We then looked at how magnets **attract** some materials and that they are often metals. The children were able to use the bar magnets to investigate which objects are **magnetic** and which aren't.

On **Tuesday 11th of July**, Year 3 and Year 4 will have their **Strings Concert** and they will be performing at St. Andrew's Church. Please support your child in practising for at least 20 to 30 minutes every day by using their music sheet. We are very excited to watch their performance as we have seen the children work very hard during their violin lessons! Please also ensure that you are continuing to support your child completing their homework. They should be engaging with the online platforms available to them, including TTRS and Accelerated Reader, and they should be completing their weekly Maths and Mental Maths booklets with the daily activities alongside. These should be signed and ready to be brought in on Friday.

### **Y4 Update**

This week in Year 4 has been an exciting one! We had our transition day on Thursday, and the children spent some time with their new Year 5 classes and teachers.

In Reading, we have started to read the poem Books are Door-Shaped by an American poet named Margarita Engle. Children learned the new vocabulary: **eager, enticing** and **permitted.** Then, they used these words in their own sentences. In Maths, we have started our new unit on 3-D shapes, and children have investigated the properties of these shapes using the key vocabulary edge, vertices and sides.

In Science, we continued learning about Electricity. The children were able to build circuits using wires, an appliance (lightbulb, buzzer) and batteries. In Art, we have started cross-stitching our bookmarks, and fine motor skills are being challenged.

Please be reminded that our **Year 3 and 4 Strings Concert is at St Andrew's Church on Tuesday 11th July!** We are very excited that the children are receiving this opportunity, and every child should be practising their violin every day for at least 20 minutes. In addition to this, please continue to support your child in their Reading and Maths homework as usual.

### Y5 Update

Year 5 have had an exciting week finding out the results of their Pupil Leadership applications, as mentioned above, and enjoyed celebrating during our ceremony. This week in Reading, we read an extract about Victorian workhouses and factories - exploring how low wages were a problem for many people during that time. This linked to our History lesson where we learnt about the Factory Act in 1833 and debated how much difference this made to child labour. In Mathematics, we looked at solving money problems using addition and subtraction with decimals, as well as calculating change when spending money. We then moved onto looking at consecutive numbers and finding patterns when adding or subtracting these using mental strategies. In Science, we continued to explore puberty and the changes boys and girls go through physically and emotionally. We discussed similarities and differences between boys and girls when getting older. In Art, we continued sketching the famous 'Surprise!' painting by Henri Rousseau and thinking about poetry that could link to this. This connected well with our new Writing focus which is poetry to entertain. We looked at different types of rhyming poems and explored what rhythm and rhyme schemes were. Children enjoyed reading the poems aloud.

Next week, we are looking forward to our trip to the London Museum of Steam and Water. We would love some more parent volunteers to support on the trip so that this enrichment experience can go ahead - please sign up on the form if you would be happy to join. Thank you - Year 5 team.

### Y6 Update

This week has been yet another busy one for Year 6! As we draw ever closer to our final year at Roxbourne, we have been working extremely hard to make sure we go out with a bang! In Science, we have started our new topic, 'Circulation and Lifestyle' where in this unit, we will be learning about the circulatory system, as well as the effect exercise can have on our heart and other organs. In History, we have continued our topic, 'Making our Mark', where this week we have learned about how people around the world have protested for gender equality. We looked at two movements, the Suffragists and Suffragettes, both of which raised national and global awareness around women's rights. However, we also had some good discussions about whether or not it's every okay to resort to violence when protesting for an issue you're passionate about.

This week has also been our last full week to rehearse and make final preparations for our end of year production, '**The Lion King'**. For the past 2 months, the children have been working extremely hard on the acting, singing and transitions between scenes in order to put on the show of a lifetime! We're very excited to perform in front of parents next **Wednesday 12th July and Thursday 13th July**. Make sure you fill in this google form in order to book tickets!

On Thursday, we were extremely excited to have had the opportunity to go to the Lyceum Theatre to watch The Lion King show, performed by professionals! The children were in awe at the performance, which served as further motivation to make our own show as memorable as possible!




