#### What's the new ticketing system?

This year, Friends of Roxbourne Community are introducing a new unlimited ticketing system that allows access to ALL rides and games (excluding Dragons Den and Money Day stalls). We are also continuing with our traditional entry fee and pay per activity option.

### FAQ'S/TERMS & CONDITIONS

### Do I have to buy an unlimited ticket for my child?

NO - You can purchase an entry ticket and then pay per ride/game/activity, however the unlimited ticket option is much better value for money if your child goes on 3 rides or more. See table on previous page for rides/game/activities price breakdown.

#### Refunds/Exchanges

Refunds: please note this ticket is non-refundable.

Exchange: please note you will not be able to exchange your ticket from an entry only to unlimited ticket or vice versa. If you wish to do so, you will need to purchase a new ticket.

### What about pupil premium?

A pupil premium advance child unlimited ticket option will be available via the school.

### What is not included in the unlimited ticket?

All food & drink, Dragons Den and KS1/KS2 stall activities are to be paid for separately.

### Can I have a go on the rides or activities with an adult entry ticket?

YES – There are a few adult friendly rides, however these will need to be paid for separately. See table on previous page for rides/game/activities price breakdown.

### Do all children need to be accompanied by an adult?

Children age 12 and above can attend without an adult provided their parent or carer provides consent.

### My year 6 child is taking part in Dragons Den. Do they need a ticket?

NO – year 6 children who are taking part in Dragons Den do not need to purchase a ticket. However, any other attending family members will require a ticket.

### My year 6 child is NOT taking part in Dragons Den. Do they need a ticket and does an adult need to accompany them?

YES – year 6 children who are NOT taking part in Dragons Den will need to purchase a ticket, and attend with an adult. All family members attending will require a ticket.

# Year Group Update

### **Nursery Update**

Nursery has had an exciting week. We started the week with sports day on Monday; both parents and pupils enjoyed the activities. Pupils were given a certificate, a medal and they enjoyed an ice cream whilst watching their competitive parents in action:). In Literacy we have been busy developing our phonic skills and practising letter formation. It's pleasing to see pupils can write their names independently. In Maths we are revising number recognition, counting and number formation.





### **Reception Update**

We have reached the penultimate week of this academic year. We are finishing off our curriculum in all areas ready for the last week.

In Writing, we continued looking at a recount of our trip to the Ruislip Lido. Last week we explored the text and came up with actions to help us remember the sentences (this makes the writing process easier for beginning writers).

This week saw us take to our writing books and write our own recount of the Ruislip Lido Trip. The children have done a fantastic job with their writing - Well Done!

In Humanities, we rounded off our topic by looking at features of a treasure map. We used the story of 'The Treasure of Pirate Frank' as inspiration and looked at the features of the map used in the story. We then had the opportunity during busy learning to create our own treasure map.

We also had the chance to dress a pirate during our busy learning which proved a popular activity this week.

In the afternoons this week, we have tried to practise our sporting skills ready for Sports Day on Monday. From throwing javelins to the obligatory 'Egg and Spoon' Race, the children seem ready to show their sporting prowess in the events on Monday.

### **Graduation Ceremony**



A reminder that Wednesday 19th July is the Graduation Ceremony for the children in Reception. We have planned a ceremony for you to see your children graduate from Early Years ready for their journey into the 'Big School' for their start in KS1. It promises to be a lovely day and we would love to see you all there.

### **Sports Day**

Monday 17th is sports day for all of Roxbourne Primary School. Reception and KS1 will be competing from 9:00 to 12:00 and it would be great to see the parents come and cheer their little competitors on! Remember to wear PE kits and a t-shirt that is the colour of the house your child is in. FORC will have refreshments available to purchase on the day or bring your own and put down a picnic blanket and enjoy the sporting fun.



### Y1 Update

This week in Maths, Year 1 has been continuing our learning of **capacity.** We are measuring in **non-standard** units and have different sized containers to measure in. We also liked to make estimates based on the size of the container. In Writing, Year 1 has been extremely busy **box planning** our own **acrostic** poem! First, we **analysed** an acrostic poem to understand the **features**, then we got busy making our own. We know that the first letter of each line spells out the poem's theme. We are now able to use our box plan to write our own acrostic poems.

This week in History, we have been planning a trip to the seaside- learning all about being safe at the seaside. We know there are four rules that we should follow; 1. **Stop and Think** 2. **Stay Together** 3. **Float** 4. **Call 999/112 or Shout for help**. We also designed a poster using the information we had learnt to promote beach safety! In Science this week, we researched the question 'Why are plants important?'. We know **plants** are important because they **create** the **air** we **breathe**. Plants can also be used to make **medicine** and **materials**. We were able to **sort** different foods into the correct category. This week in Art, we are continuing to learn about **sculptures**. We looked at the famous '**The Angel of the North by Antony Gormley'**. We found out some interesting facts! Facts which we are able to use when sketching and planning our own sculptures.

### Year 1 trip to Brighton Beach

On Monday, Year 1 were lucky enough to take a trip to Brighton beach! We had ice lollies, dipped our toes in the water and took a lovely stroll on the pier. Check out the photos below which captured some of our best and most favourite moments.

### **Sports Day**

On Monday 17th July between 09:00-12:00, we have our annual sports day! Please can you remind your child of what house they are in (because that will determine what colour they wear). As always, Year 1 welcomes and encourages parents to stay and watch to support our races. There may even be a chance for parents to compete against teachers!















### **Y2 Update**

This week in Year 2 we went on a lovely trip to Kew Gardens. The children became explorers in our workshop and got to use a wide range of equipment. Thank you to all of our helpers who supported us throughout our trip!

In Writing this week we have been finishing off our poem about a Historically Significant person. We have thought really hard about all the rhyming words we have used. In Maths we consolidated our knowledge of our array's unit. The children displayed a great understanding. We have finished our History unit of significant people and finalised our observation for our Science experiment.

### **Y3 Update**

This week, on Tuesday, the children went to St. Andrew's Church for the Year3 and Year 4 Concert. The children have all worked so hard this year and the performance was amazing. It was wonderful to see so many parents and family members there to support them.

This week in Year 3, the children have been reading a short story called 'Daedalus and Icarus', which is directly linked to our topic of Ancient Greeks in History. We focused on learning 6 new vocabulary: **craftsman, invent, reveal, bound, overwhelmed,** and **hovered.** The children completed various activities to understand the meaning of these words in more detail. Using this vocabulary knowledge, they then answered retrieval and inference questions about the text. We had an interesting class discussion where we made comparisons with the Greek stories that we have previously read, such as *Pandora's Box*.

In Writing, we continued with our genre of poetry. We have created a box plan with our ideas in note form to support us in writing a poem about our experiences and memories in Year 3. Using *Pandora's Box* as inspiration, we have focused on writing a poem about a magical box, which contains different memories and feelings that we have experienced throughout the year. The children were able to think back to some of the books that we have read, enrichment trips that they have been on and make connections with their own personal experiences to write a poem which will entertain the reader.

In History we have continued learning about the Greeks and the way they lived their lives. This week we learned about different forms of governance and how the City-States were run. We learned about the two Persian Wars, both won by Athens and we learnt about how the Parthenon was built. In Science we continued our discovery of magnets and this week focused on the strength of different magnets. We carried out an investigation and recorded our results in a bar chart.

Please send your child in with an extra bag this week as we will be sending home the books they have completed throughout the year. Also a quick reminder that there will be sports day on Monday and your child should come in wearing a T-shirt in the colour of their house.

### **Y4 Update**

This week has been an eventful one for Year 4. On Tuesday, we went to St. Andrews Church for the Year 3 and Year 4 Strings Concert. It was lovely to see so many parents in the audience and the children were very excited to showcase their progress this year! You can find our updates on the Roxbourne social media pages or check out some photos below.







In Reading, we have continued to read 'Books are Door Shaped' by Margarita Engle, retrieving and inferring information about the text. In Writing, the children enjoyed learning about free verse poetry, performing with expression and familiarising themselves with this new form of poetry. They planned their own free verse poem about Texas, including the five senses. They also included features of free verse poetry such as expanded noun phrases, similes, metaphors, personification, rule of three and repetition.

In Maths, we have concluded our unit on 3-D shapes, investigating and reasoning with 3-D shapes from 2-D representations.

Please bring extra bags for the children to take home their work from throughout the year as we will be sending this home next week. Please also be reminded that Sports Day will be taking place on Monday 17th July, and children should come to school in their house colours.

### Y5 Update

Year 5 had a busy week as always! In Reading, we looked at an extract about the steam train invention during the Industrial Revolution period. We enjoyed watching a video to give us more information about the differences between first, second and third class carriages - including Queen Victoria's first ride on a train! We also learnt about locomotives in both Reading and History, which linked perfectly to our visit to the London Museum of Water and Steam. On Wednesday, we took the train to Chiswick and walked to the museum. We were able to explore lots of different areas of the museum, including looking at the various engines and had fun interacting with the displays (see pictures below). We then headed to Brentford Lock after lunch to explore the canal and just about managed to escape the rain!

In Writing this week, we read the Spider and the Fly by Mary Howitt and looked at how rhythm is important in poetry, especially narrative poems. Children performed the poem aloud to the class to understand the rhythmic patterns and then analysed how dialogue can be used in poetry. We came up with our own examples of dialogue to use when planning our own version of the poem. In Maths, we continued to explore and investigate numbers. We had fun looking at palindromic numbers as well as tricks to find multiples of 9 and 11. In Science, we made an advice leaflet to support children going through puberty, including places to get help and support.





### Y6 Update

What a penultimate week it's been for Year 6! The highlight of the week has undoubtedly been the success of The Lion King! On Monday we had our first dress rehearsal in front of KS2. This was our first performance with masks and costumes which gave our younger pupils lots of laughs and giggles! On Wednesday and Thursday night, we had our official performances in front of parents, which were both very successful! We thank all parents and family who came to support the children. And a big thank you goes to all of the children who have worked tirelessly over the past 7 weeks to make the show as great as it was!

In History, we have continued our topic, Making our Mark, where this week we have looked at how people around the world have protested for racial equality. We looked specifically at the Black Lives Matter movement, a modern day campaign fighting against racism around the world. In Science, we have also continued our topic Circulation and Lifestyle. This week we looked specifically at the purpose and function of the heart.

Year 6 graduation will take place on Thursday 20th July. We are kindly asking for food donations for the event. Food that can be donated is packaged shop bought items, as well as home baked cakes. Any donations of this sort will be greatly appreciated.
