## Year Group Update

## Nursery Update

In Literacy we have been retelling the story 'The very hungry caterpillar' by acting it out and using props. The children have painted their own butterflies and we have talked about symmetrical patterns whilst painting. Our caterpillars are growing and getting bigger and some have started to spin.

In Maths we have been learning to count accurately to 6. Please involve your child in counting activities at home. They could help you count the vegetables or count the number of plates at the dinner table.

In PSHE we have talked about the importance of sleep. We would like to encourage all parents to implement a sleep routine and children should be in bed by 7:30 after a shared story.

We look forward to a new story next week which is titled 'Walking through the jungle'.


## Reception Update

It has been another busy week in Reception! We have really enjoyed getting into the new phase of our Humanities unit of Growing and have really got our hands dirty this week, planting lots of flowers, bulbs, seeds and herbs! We have learnt about the life cycle of plants and have thought about this in the context of sunflowers. We have even planted our own sunflower seeds to see this cycle first hand.

In writing this week we have really expanded our learning through writing diary entries about the story 'Jasper's Beanstalk'. The children have produced some fantastic writing this week and should all be extremely proud of themselves. Next week we will be starting our new (and final) story for this half term 'Oliver's Vegetables'. The story of Oliver's Vegetables is about a boy called Oliver who goes to visit his Grandpa who grows vegetables in his garden. Oliver gets to try lots of new and different vegetables and at the end, uses the potatoes he finds to make his favourite food...chips! Please watch this video of Miss Gurney telling the story of Oliver's Vegetables with your children over the weekend to familiarise them with the story.


In Maths this week we have continued to develop our understanding of numbers up to 15 . We have been working on our number recognition and ordering of numbers and have been thinking about how to find one more/greater and one less/fewer than a certain number/amount, remembering that if we want to find one more, we must add one on, and if we want to find one less, we must take one away. Please practice this at home with your child by playing this game with numbers up to 20.

## Homework

Please ensure you are reading with your children daily and recording your comments in the orange Reading Records Book on a daily basis. Please have fun with the books. Talk about the pictures and the story. Ask simple questions to gauge comprehension (in a fun way) and just enjoy the time with your children. It is a great way to settle children before bed and spend a little time with them before they go to sleep at night. Please remember to return Library books every Friday!

Many of your children will have been sent home with a phonics book on top of their usual library book. Please ensure that you are reading this book with your child at home to give them the best opportunity to progress their reading skills. These books must also be returned every Friday for your child to receive a new one.

## Show and Tell

We have sent our 'show and tell book' home with two new children from each class. Over the weekend that your child has this book, we would like them to draw and label an image, or write some short sentences about what they have done over the weekend and present this to the class on Monday during our show and tell session. Each weekend 2 different children will receive the book and complete another page about their own weekends.

## Y1 Update

Today in Year 1, we have enjoyed dressing up in our own clothes with a splash of red to raise money for Comic Relief. Thank you to all the children who brought in a donation!

In Maths this week, we have started looking at measurement. We have been using key vocabulary such as length, height, longer, shorter and taller. We looked and compared two different objects, discussing whether they are longer, shorter or taller. Then, we
moved on to discussing how we can measure objects. As a class, we measured different objects using our hands as a form of measurement.

In Writing this week, we were invited to Bob's birthday party. At the birthday party, we took part in games such as duck duck goose and musical statues. We sang happy birthday to Bob and had a wonderful time. We looked and analysed the features of an informal letter.

In Science, we have been looking at the different animals that would make good pets. Pets such as hamsters, dogs and fish are good pets because they are gentle, patient and not dangerous. Some animals like tigers, lions and poisonous snakes are too fierce and dangerous to have as pets. Pets need water, food and space to be happy and healthy.

In History, we were looking at how transport has changed in our local area. We learnt that some types of transport are only used in certain areas and that transport in our local area has changed over time. Also, underground railways were built under the cities to reduce traffic on the road.

## Y2 Update

This week in Year 2 we have finished our Money unit in Maths which has involved adding amounts, calculating change and finding different ways to make totals. Next week, we will be moving onto our shapes unit. Please continue to log into TTRS and complete any gigs and keep practising.

During Writing we have planned and written a narrative inspired by the story of Jeremiah in the Dark Woods where children have incorporated characters from other well known fairy tales and used them as secondary characters. Children had the focus of writing expanded noun phrases and using commas for lists.

In Science, we have been learning about simple food chains and identified predators and their prey.

In Geography, we have learned about the Sahara and the Arctic and compared the different regions based on their climate and wildlife.

In DT we have constructed a recipe and method for cooking Easter themed Hot Cross Buns which we will eventually be baking.

## Y3 Update

In Reading this week, we read a story called 'Julius Zebra Entangled with the Egyptians' by Gary Northfield. We discussed some key vocabulary, including: determined, scoundrel, desperately, stumbled, squealed and soggy. The children then applied retrieval and inference skills to answer questions about the text, following the key steps to success. It was fantastic to see the word determined being used in many sentences, especially those related to improving homework scores!

In Mathematics, we have continued with our unit on Fractions, with a specific focus on adding two fractions with the same denominator. We noticed that when doing this, the denominator stays the same and we only add the two numerators together. The children then learnt how to derive related subtraction facts from a fraction addition equation. We followed the key steps to complete the independent task successfully.

In Writing, we have started with our new (and final) genre for this half-term: writing a non-chronological report (purpose is to inform). This week, we focused on a few important features that are typically found in non-chronological reports. We began by writing an introduction to introduce what the report will be about (Ancient Egyptians) before creating our own fact boxes that list interesting facts using bullet points to inform the reader. We were very shocked by some of the facts that we researched, with one being that Ancient Egyptian bakers sometimes kneaded bread dough with their feet!

In Design and Technology, we made a start on our topic called Shadows and Puppets. We learnt about the three types of puppets that exist: marionette, shadow puppets and hand puppets. We watched an interesting scene of marionette puppets used comedically to present a show. The children then drew a table in their sketchbooks to present the three types of puppets by sketching them and labelling them with their specific information (i.e. marionette puppets use strings to control movement).

Today, we celebrated Red Nose Day as a school. It was great to see the children wearing red or a splash of red to show their support to the Comic Relief Cause. We discussed and explored different ways to raise money for it.

Please continue to support your child by engaging with all of the online homework portals. They are required to achieve a minimum of 200 correct answers and points on TTRS and Mathletics every week as well as complete a quiz on Accelerated Reader for their reading book once finished. Completing the weekly homework set has a direct impact on your child's learning at school.

## Y4 Update

In Reading this week, we read a poem titled 'Polluted', which describes the state of the earth and climate. We learnt 6 new words from the text: untouched, pungent, menacing, contaminated, exposed and interfering. We also used our retrieval and inference skills to discuss what the poem is trying to convey, and the expressive words the writer had chosen to use.

In Maths, we continued our unit on decimals. We learnt how to order decimals by comparing the ones, tenths and hundredths value, and how to multiply and divide decimals by 10 using a place value chart. We also now know the decimal equivalents of halves and quarters!

In Writing, we moved on to our next genre - speeches. We are still writing to persuade, and we discussed how some of the features from advertisements might also be useful in speeches. We looked at the features that make a speech persuasive, and analysed some speeches to see how they are used in context.

In Geography, we continued our unit on the Amazon, and learnt about rivers, and how rivers like the Amazon river run their course. It was a lovely way to revisit our previous learning about the water cycle from Science, as we learnt that even though the water cycle affects rivers, the amount of water on earth never changes. We also learnt that there are 3 parts to a river: the upper course, middle course and lower course.

In Science, we learnt about whether environments can change, and why events such as tsunamis, deforestation and earthquakes might have both positive and negative effects. We thought about which environmental changes are natural and which are man-made, and why deforestation might not have a straightforward solution because of all its advantages and disadvantages.

## Y5 Update

This week in Reading, we continued to read the novel 'Floodland' by Michael Sedgwick. We are starting to find out more about Zoe and Dooby, and why he is such a great leader. Also, we have been introduced to a new character called 'William' who appears to be very mysterious. Additionally, we learnt the definition of six new words this week: huddled, primitive, suspiciously, infernal, peering and glared. Using our retrieval and inference skills, we answered questions based on the text.

During Maths this week, we started by looking at fractions of amounts. First, we know we can divide the whole number by the denominator, then, multiply the answer by the numerator. We also used counters to help us make arrays to represent fractions. Later on in the week, we moved on to percentages! We know that percent means 'per hundred'. To support our learning, we used bead strings to represent 100.

In Writing, we have been looking at diary entries. We started the week by looking at different types of diaries and what makes a good diary! We know that thoughts and feelings are an essential part when writing a diary. Then, Y5 had the opportunity to hot-seat! The
class chose someone to represent a tsunami survivor, and we asked them questions about their experiences. It was important to reflect on the answers we received.

This week in Geography, we answered the question 'what happens when an earthquake strikes?' We know whether a country is poor or rich, the effects of an earthquake can differ. People need to prepare before, during and after if they can. To support infrastructure, engineers would build buildings that can 'wobble' which stops them from collapsing.

## Y6 Update

This week in Reading, Y 6 have read an extract based on the novel Goodnight Mr Tom written by Michelle Magorian. This book, similar to our class novel, Friend or Foe, is about a young boy who is evacuated to the countryside during World War Two where he flourishes under the care of Mr Tom Oakley. Our three pieces of vocabulary this week were: Earnestly, Whimper and Disperse. We also worked hard developing our retrieval, inference and word meaning skills.

In Maths, we have been looking at the similarities and link between fractions, decimals and percentages and how each one has an equivalent value. For example, $5 / 10,0.5$ and $50 \%$ are all equivalent. We have also been looking at how to work out the mean from a set of values.

In Writing, we have been publishing our war narratives based on The Battle of the Somme. Last week, our narratives were based from the perspective of the German army, however, this week, our focus shifted to the perspective of the British army. With both narratives, our focus was ensuring we included a dark tone to display the realities of war through describing the trenches and the scene of battle.

In History, we continued our topic, Conflict and Resolution, where this week we learned about how World War Two came to an end. We know that Germany eventually surrendered after being overrun by the British, Russian and American armies in May 1945, however, Japan, another country in the axis powers, did not surrender until September 1945 when the war was declared over. We also learned about the effect the war had on Britain, and the vast changes made by the government to ensure its citizens do not have to suffer like they did during the war.

In Science, we continued our topic, Evolution and Inheritance, where this week, we learned about how animals go extinct. We discussed the many factors that may endanger animals and put them at risk, such as: loss of habitat, lack of food, poor adaptations and more. We also learned about how sometimes, natural events and disasters could cause a mass extinction, such as a volcanic eruption, an asteroid strike or an ice age.

Please ensure the children are reading for a minimum of $\mathbf{2 0}$ minutes per day at home. This is vital for their development in fluency and understanding. Upon completion of a book, please also ensure that the children are taking a quiz on Accelerated Reader to consolidate and test their comprehension. Please also ensure the children are continuing to complete their assigned Reading CGP, Maths New Wave and English New Wave homework as well as completing set tasks on TTRS and Mathletics.
