Year Group Update

Nursery Update

It was lovely to meet you all during parents' evening and hopefully you found this to be informative and will support your child to further their learning at home.

In Literacy we have been retelling our focus story 'Winnie the Witch' using a story map as well as drawing our own story maps. Please continue to retell the story at home using the link from last week. Next week our focus will be on rhyming words, and here's the link to Let's find the Rhymes.

In Maths we are learning to count, order and form numbers to 7, please practise this at home using digit cards.

In PE our focus this week was bouncing and catching a ball to support our hand - eye coordination.



Reception Update

Firstly, a huge thank you to all parents who attended parent consultations this week! It was fantastic for all of us to have the opportunity to speak to you all about your children's progress throughout the year and we are really looking forward to seeing all of the children continue to progress throughout the remainder of their time in Reception.

In our **Humanities** lessons week the children have really enjoyed learning about the features of a castle and have created some fantastic castle paintings and accompanying writing for us to display in our classrooms. In **Science**, we have continued on our learning journey about pond habitats, learning all about the different birds, mini-beasts and amphibians that live in and around ponds.

In Writing this week we have been producing some fantastic independent pieces of work about our current story 'The Very Last Castle'.

All of the children have been working very hard to make sure they are including finger spaces in their writing. Next week we will be starting a new story in writing, 'The Princess Knight'. Please watch <u>this video</u> recording of Ms Saeed retelling the story of The Princess Knight over the weekend to support your child's understanding and memorisation of the story.



We have had a very big week in **Maths** where we looked at both addition and subtraction up to 15! All of the children are becoming increasingly confident with their mathematical knowledge as the year is going on and it is brilliant to see! Next week we will be looking at one more and one less as well as doubling and halving.

Mediaeval Afternoon - 8th May 2024


On 8th May we will be holding a Mediaeval afternoon for the children to consolidate and celebrate all of their learning this half term around our castles, knights and dragons topic. The children are encouraged to come into school in a themed costume on the day. <u>Homework</u>

Please ensure you are reading with your children daily and recording your comments in the orange Reading Records Book on a daily basis. Please have fun with the books. Talk about the pictures and the story. Ask simple questions to gauge comprehension (in a fun way) and just enjoy the time with your children. It is a great way to settle children before bed and spend a little time with them before they go to sleep at night. Please remember to return Library books every **Friday**!

Y1 Update

This week in **Maths** we have continued to look at numbers from 50 to 100 and beyond! In particular, we have been exploring one more and one less than, as well as, ten more and ten less than. To help us, we have been using dienes to represent the numbers. We then found them on a number line and were comparing numbers that were more than or less than one another.

In **Writing** we have been discovering what a recount is and the features of a recount. We know that the purpose of a recount is to inform and its main features are first person, adjectives, past tense and suffixes. We analysed a model recount to inspire our own writing and have started to box plan our own on Small Knight and George, imagining that we are the character of Small Knight. We can't wait to write them!

In **Science** we looked at how the weather changes as we go into Spring and Summer. We know that the number of hours of daylight increases and the weather gets warmer. Spring weather can vary from warm and sunny to cold and rainy. It can even snow in Spring!

In **Geography** we were learning about Scotland. We discovered that the capital city is called Edinburgh and is located in the south of the country, like most of the cities. A capital city is where the parliament gather. In the Highlands, there are large mountains and lakes. One lake is called Loch Ness; we loved learning about the mystery of the Loch Ness Monster.

Y2 Update

This week in **Maths** we have been looking at numbers to 999. The children have been identifying hundreds, tens and ones. We have been exploring different ways to represent the same number eg. **524** - 500, 20, 4 = 300, 220, 4. To support our learning we have been using part-whole models and dienes. In **Writing** we have been focusing on a biography about Marcus Rashord. The children have been identifying the different features which they must include. We have used subheadings, list sentences, conjunctions and expanded noun phrases.

In **History** we have continued our new unit 'They Made a Difference' we have been focusing on Human Rights and why it is important that we have these. The children thought about what Human Rights linked to the work Marcus Rashford did. . In **Science** we have continued our unit 'Protecting our Environment'. The children have been looking around our school environment and identified the different waste we as a school produce. We then put all our findings into a bar chart. In **Art** this week we have been exploring different materials and deciding which is the best one to represent hair. We each drew a self portrait and incorporated different materials to add texture to our hair.

Y3 Update

Today, we kicked off with our **Year 3 Residential**! The children have completed their first activities for the school day, including going to Roxbourne Park to complete the photo challenge (take a look at this below!). We are getting ready to continue our activities into the evening and the children are very excited to stay overnight!



This week in **Reading**, we read a story called '*Zoo Visit*', which is about a girl who visits the Zoo as it is her birthday but sees animals in captivity. We discussed the key vocabulary: **captivity**, **poacher**, **adopt**, **sustainable**, **decline** and **ethical**. We also had a class discussion on what we could do moving forward to help keep the planet sustainable.

In **Mathematics**, we have continued with our unit on **Angles**. We looked closely at different types of angles, such as **acute**, **obtuse** and **right-angles**. We know that perpendicular lines meet to form a right-angle whereas parallel lines do not meet and have an equal distance at any point.

In **Writing**, we have continued with our genre of writing a **persuasive letter** (purpose is **to persuade**). This week, we box planned a letter intended to persuade Mr Benserghin to do more for recycling in our school. We included the key features from the success criteria checklist before we began writing.

In **Science**, we have started with our new topic: **Plants**. We learnt about the five requirements that plants need in order to survive: space to grow, light, air, water and nutrients from soil. In groups, the children conducted an investigation by planting a poppy seed but removing one of the requirements and we will be tracking this over the half-term to record our results.

Please continue to support your child by engaging with all of the online homework portals. They are required to achieve a **minimum** of **200 correct answers and points** on TTRS and Mathletics every week as well as complete a **quiz** on Accelerated Reader for their reading book once finished. Completing the weekly homework set has a direct impact on your child's learning at school.

Y4 Update

A huge thank you to all the parents who attended Parents Consultations this week! It was wonderful to speak about your childrens' learning as well as show you the incredible progress and growth that they have achieved throughout the year. We look forward to seeing this continuous improvement.

This week in **Reading**, we have continued the extract 'Rain Player', a Mayan folktale about a man who challenges the god of rain: Chac. The children learned new vocabulary : *chided, sacred, inspecting, counsel, plight, plea* and applied these to their own sentences, and they answered retrieval and inference questions about the text.

In **Writing**, we have been writing a setting description based on the city of gold 'El Dorado' using figurative language and grammar features such as fronted adverbial and emotion word using a comma which will also be used next week in independent writing.

In **Maths**, we have come to the end of our unit on area and perimeter. This week we have been measuring area and perimeter using a metre stick . Next week, we will be starting our new unit 'solving measures and money' problems'.

In **History**, we have started our new and exciting topic of the Maya civilization. We have learned about the Mayans and where they lived, as well as what the area was like.

In **Science**, we investigated what sound waves are and how they travel to your ear. Pupils investigated travelling sounds by walking around the school and stopping at different locations to describe what they can hear, but also consider what the sound has travelled through to reach their ears e.g solids, liquids or gases.

Y5 Update

This week in **Reading**, we read 'The Turtle of Oman' by Naomi Shihbab Nye. We read the opening chapter, where a boy named Amer is at the airport and about to move to America from Muscat, Oman. We discussed his family and the airport description, inferring what was going on and why this was important. In **Writing**, we planned our setting description to entertain the reader based on 'Oranges in No Man's Land' by Elizabeth Laird. We wrote a description of Beirut, Lebanon before the war - including lots of contextual information and powerful description. In **Maths** this week, we finished our unit on transformation and have moved onto looking at conversion. We explored converting units of time, including minutes, hours and seconds using our multiples of 6 to support. We looked at time problems to apply our knowledge of conversion.

In **Science**, we explored the life cycles of birds and amphibians. We discussed what was similar or different to these cycles compared to mammals. In **History**, we explored why Baghdad was called the Round City and how the location was key for its development.

Please continue to ensure the children are continuing to engage with all homework provision. Your child must read a minimum of 20 minutes a night of a book on their coloured band from the library. Upon completion of a book, the children must then complete a quiz on Accelerated Reader. Please also ensure the children are completing their weekly Reading CGP comprehension, their Maths and Writing New Wave and all activities set on Mathletics and TTRS.

Y6 Update

This week in **Reading**, Year 6 have read a fiction extract, titled **A Visit To Baba Yaga**. In this extract, a young, innocent girl named Natasha is tricked by her evil stepmother and falls into the hands of the cruel and wicked witch, Baba Yaga. Our three key vocabulary words for the week were: **Idyllic**, **Quavering** and **Ravenously**. We have also worked on developing our retrieval, inference and word meaning skills.

In **Maths**, we have covered and recapped a range of reasoning style questions across the following topics: 4 operations, missing number cards, rounding, as well as problems involving shape and money too.

In **Writing,** the children have written, edited and published their narratives based on the boggart scene from Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban. In this piece of writing, the children used their creative skills to imagine their worst fear transformed into something funny. In our narrative, we used a range of figurative language to describe setting and characters, as well as dialogue to advance the action.

In **Geography**, we have started our new topic, **Global Challenges - Climate Change**, where this week, we learned about the 5 different climate zones. These are: **Tropical**, **Arid**, **Mediterranean**, **Temperate** and **Subpolar**. We also discussed the different types of land: **Urban**, **Agricultural and Forest** land.

In **Science**, we have started our new topic, **Electricity and Circuits**, where this week, we discussed different uses of electricity. We also looked at different electrical appliances and discussed what types of energy they give off. For example, wer argued that kettles can give off heat, sound and light energy.



Attendance

Our current whole school attendance is 95.6%, which falls below **our target of 96%**. Please read through our policy to ensure you understand the expectation in terms of attendance and punctuality, which is available on our<u>school website</u>

Late delivery items

We previously communicated through our Newsletter, that if your child(ren) has forgotten an item, any late delivery items should be left in a box in the office. Our Year 6 monitors will collect and deliver to pupils at 12:00 as long as they are clearly labelled. If the item isn't labelled, it will not be delivered.

Notifying the school of your child's absence

If your child is absent from school please call the **school office on 0208 422 9207 before 9am**. You must contact the school daily to report their absence and the reason by 9am.

If the reason for absence is sickness/vomiting/stomach upset please note that we follow the Health Protection Agency guidelines which advise exclusion from school for 48 hours after the last sickness/vomiting/stomach upset incident. This is to try to prevent cross infection as much as possible.

As a parent you can help us by:

- Ensuring your child attends school on each day the school is open for the pupils unless there is an 'authorisable' reason to be absent. Only the school can authorise an absence.
- Phoning the school on each day of absence by 9.00am, with a reason for an absence.
- Keeping the school updated by telephone, email, or letter of any changes of circumstances.
- Providing a timely reason, satisfactory to the school, for an absence; otherwise, the absence will remain unauthorised
- Arranging (where possible) all non-emergency medical and dental appointments out of school hours or during school holidays.
- Avoiding booking holidays during term time.
- Checking Arbor to ensure you have at least 2 main contacts should we need to contact you.

Punctuality

A gentle reminder to all parents and carers to be mindful about children's punctuality to school.

Over the last term, we have seen an increase in the number of children arriving after the morning register. Any child arriving after 9:15am has to be registered as an unauthorised late, unless we have evidence of an appointment e.g. dentist, GP or hospital appointment.

Nursery Universal Entitlement: Please note, in Nursery, all three and four year olds are entitled to 15 hours per week of early year's education each academic year from the start of the term after their third birthday - this is known as the *universal entitlement*.

Nursery 30 Hour Provision: Three and four year olds, whose parents meet a government criteria, are also eligible for an additional 15 hours per week at zero cost to the parent - this is known as the *extended entitlement*. 
