#### Friday 3rd February 2023 - TTRS Competition

February 3rd is NSPCC Number Day! As part of our commitment to make maths exciting and high profile in our school, we've decided to take part in a friendly competition involving schools in the United Kingdom. It's a 1-day competition which starts on Friday 3rd February 2023 at 07:30 GMT and ends at 19:30 GMT. It's all done online via play.ttrockstars.com.

Children can play in any gamemode with every correct answer to a multiplication or division question, earning themselves, their class and the school a point. The Times Tables Rock Stars platform will calculate the class average (the number of correct answers per pupil in the class who play during the competition hours, subject to a 60-minute limit (see below)). Winning classes in the school and in the competition as a whole will be the ones with the highest average.

To support player wellbeing, there is a time limit of 60-minutes per player. In other words, each player can earn competition points for up to 60-minutes between 07:30 GMT and 19:30 GMT on Friday 3rd February. Once the player goes beyond 60-minutes of play on that day, they will still earn coins but will no longer earn points towards the competition.

## Year Group Updates

#### **Nursery Update**

This week we have started a new story called 'The Train Ride'. This picture book tells the story of a little girl who goes to visit her grandmother who lives by the sea. On the way she talks about what she sees. Pupils are thoroughly enjoying our small world activity which supports the retelling of the story as well as learning new vocabulary. The train set is the most popular activity this week as well as playdough vehicles that children are making using playdough.

In maths our focus is on 2D shapes. Children are exploring 2D shapes across the classroom and have been busy making 2D shape pictures. As part of our topic on transport, we have discussed traffic lights. We made our own traffic lights and played a game to encourage the children to remember the meanings of the different coloured lights.







#### **Reception Update**

We have had a very exciting week in Reception this week with our fantastic trip to Kidzania on Wednesday. Not only did

the children get to be the adults for the day, earning 'money' through doing different jobs, they also ventured onto not one, but two modes of public transport, which is an incredible feat in itself!



At Kidzania the children had an opportunity to learn about and experience how doctors, the police and firefighters can help us. We got into some great costumes, marched around patrolling as police, rode around in a fire engine and even got to fly a plane! The children enjoyed the trip thoroughly and threw themselves into every activity.



They practised their patience and were wonderful at waiting for their turn and showed their awareness when getting public transport! A big well done to all of the children for giving their all! Thank you as well to all of the fantastic parents who came with us, we couldn't have done it without your help!





In Maths this week we have been consolidating our knowledge of the days of the week and months of the year and have been thinking about the sequencing events that happen in the morning, afternoon and evening.

In writing this week we have been working together to create a storyboard for 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' and have been practising reciting the story with actions.

The children have really enjoyed learning about houses from the past this week and have learnt lots of new vocabulary to use in the home corner.





#### Y1 Update

This week in writing we have been focusing on analysing informal letters. We know that informal letters are sent to people we know. For Maths, we have been describing and completing number patterns. In History, we have been investigating boats from the past and present as well as looking at travel conditions in the past. This week in Science our focus has been on grouping animals into different categories based on their characteristics. We looked at how scientists use special categories to group animals such as; Mammals, Birds, Fish, Amphibians and Reptiles. We discussed that animals in each category share special characteristics. For example, Mammals are warm blooded animals with fur or hair. They give birth to live young and feed their young with their milk.

#### Y2 Update

This week, in Year 2, we wrote our narrative (story) 'The Secret Sky Garden'. We started our week by ordering the key events from the story, then we planned our narrative using key vocabulary and ideas to put them into interesting sentences.

In Maths, we have worked hard with our little clocks to explore the concept of telling the time. We started the week revising 'o'clock' and 'half past'. We then moved onto looking at the 'past' side of the clock and finally the 'to' side of the clock. Most of the children are now able to tell time to the nearest 5 minutes, which is a huge achievement! If you find your child is struggling please practise these skills at home. Please see the link below to practise time online.

In Geography, we have continued to explore the continents and we particularly focused on Oceania which is the smallest continent made up of Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and many other small islands. We also know Oceania is home to unusual native animals too. We used our computing skills to research animals from the Oceania continent. We wrote a fact file about our favourite animal.

In Science, we explored different habitats that meet the needs of different animals and plants. This week we particularly focused on microhabitats.

<u>Telling the Time</u> (online game)

#### Y3 Update

This week, on Monday, the children in Year 3 had the opportunity to visit a Buddhist Centre and listen to a Tibetan monk tell the story of Buddha.

In Reading, we have been looking at an instructional text on how to make slime. We looked at imperative verbs, unfamiliar vocabulary, retrieval and inference questions. Our new vocabulary was: **optional, squeeze, sift, thoroughly, knead and lump**. In Writing, we have been looking at the features for writing a speech, which is what we will be doing next week. We have read some famous speeches by famous people, like Martin Luther King jr., Sir Winston Churchill and Greta Thunberg.

In Geography, we have continued looking at man-made landmarks in Europe and the children wrote about their favourite three landmarks. In Science, we looked at how to protect ourselves from the effects of the Sun.

Please continue to support your child by listening to them read every day for at least 15 minutes and filling in their reading record with comments afterwards. When they complete a book, **they should also complete a quiz about the book on Accelerated Reader**. Please also support your child in engaging and interacting with Times Tables Rock Stars (TTRS) as this will help them to improve their multiplication fluency. Ensure that your child is practising their spellings every week in

preparation for the spelling tests on Friday mornings. Please find the information on homework on Google Classroom and support your child in completing those.

#### **Y4 Update**

This week, Year 4 took a trip to Thames Explorer Trust where we had the opportunity to explore the environment of the River Thames. The children enjoyed walking along the foreshore of the river, discovering the different vertebrates and invertebrates that call the river home. They were able to turn over some rocks and shells, exploring the habitat of different organisms. We also had a look at how the river changed throughout the years, and the impact the industrial revolution had on the area. You may find pictures on the Roxbourne Primary School social media sites. This informed their learning of our Science topic, where this week we continued learning about food chain, food webs and the different classifications of animals such as vertebrates, invertebrates, mammals, reptiles and amphibians.

In Reading, we focused on an extract from The Explorer by Katherine Rundell. The children practised skills in retrieval and inference, as well as learning the new vocabulary: **luminous, vile, marinating, wincing, intent** and **encrusted**. In Writing, we had a look at powerful speeches, particularly focusing on Greta Thunberg's speech. The children also researched the topic of deforestation in the Amazon rainforest, which they will be writing about in their independent write.

In Maths, we have continued with the topic of fractions. Pupils applied their knowledge of unit and non-unit fractions of a quantity to word problems and bar models.

Please continue to ensure children are reading for **at least 15 minutes each day.** Accelerated reader quizzes should be taken immediately after a book is completed, ideally every 2 weeks. It is also important that children are consistently accessing Times Tables Rockstars to ensure they recall their multiplication tables. Finally, please ensure that children are completing their Mathletics homework.

#### Y5 Update

This week in Reading, we explored the adventures of underwater photographer David Doubilet and the journey he took to become a professional diver and photographer. We looked at some of his photography and read the text about his childhood and how he grew up in New York / New Jersey, met his hero Jacques Cousteau and became a certified diver. We answered questions on the text and sequenced his life into parts.

In Writing, we continued to look at writing to persuade but this time, in adverts and leaflets. Children will be writing a persuasive leaflet to persuade visitors to visit a chosen country in Asia. We researched information and facts about our country. We watched holiday adverts and discussed the persuasive techniques used in each, as well as the target audience and why this is important. Then we analysed text leaflets to compare and contrast similarities and differences between written persuasion and video techniques.

In Maths, we explored adding and subtracting fractions with like and unlike denominators. Please continue to practise this with children at home as we know this is a key part of their SATs paper next year. We then moved onto recapping converting between mixed numbers and improper fractions.

In Geography, we continued to look at Asia - this time focusing on the parts of the Earth structure and tectonic plates, and how this can lead to earthquakes.

#### Y6 Update

This week in both Reading and Writing, we have focused on the war narrative, All Quiet on the Western Front. We have studied in detail what life was like in the trenches for soldiers in World War 1. We have also box planned our own war narrative - from the perspective of the German army. In Maths, we have focused on being able to read a variety of scales and also being able to group and classify different units of measurement. The children have done a good job justifying why they would use a specific measurement for a given scenario.

In History, we have dived into detail about the formation of trenches in the First World War and how they were formed in a way to provide as much protection for soldiers as possible. The children also got the chance to develop their very own WW1 trenches and had to justify how and why theirs would have been safe for soldiers!

In Science we have focused all around how certain animals have adapted to survive in some of the harsher environments across the world. The children were tasked with creating their own vertebrate, coming up with 6 adaptations that the animal has in order to survive.

In Art, the children have worked extremely hard in creating their own WW1 propaganda posters! Propaganda was used as a means to persuade men in Britain to enlist into the army in WW1.

#### **Young Harrow Foundation**




