



# Year Group Update

## **Nursery Update**

Welcome back to HT3 and a big well done to all of our pupils for settling into school life after the Christmas break. We have made a great start on our new topic 'Transport' and pupils are thoroughly enjoying our new roleplay 'London Bus'.

In Literacy this week we have started reading 'The Lion on the Bus'. We have been able to act out the story and sing in our new role play bus. Pupils have been learning new vocabulary and developing their language about buses through various activities across all areas of learning.

Our Maths focus is on counting accurately. Pupils are learning to count using concrete objects as well as abstract counting using claps, clicks and jumps.

We were excited to see snow on our first day back so we decided to go for a walk on the field. It was fun! We made footprints and felt the snow flakes. We were so excited to see snow melt in our hands.

In UW (Understanding the World) pupils have been introduced to how they travel to school. This activity encourages pupils to talk about different modes of transport and develops their vocabulary and sentence structure.



## **Reception Update**

Welcome back and Happy New Year to everyone! We have really enjoyed welcoming all of the Reception children back to school this week and have already made a great start on our new topic this half term, 'Traditional Tales'.

In **Writing** this week we have started learning the story of The Three Little Pigs. We have been working on our storytelling and using our storyteller voices and actions. We have been able to act out the story in our new role play area and have had so much fun doing it!

In **Maths** this week we have been learning all about calendar and time, focussing on days of the week, times of day and sequencing daily events. It has been fantastic to see everyones mathematical vocabulary and language developing over this half term.

In **Science**, we have started our new topic about materials. This week, we have learnt that a material is what something is made of, different materials are good for making different things and finally we explored different materials and discussed what they feel like whether it is bendy, strong, stiff or weak.

#### Homework

Please ensure you are reading with your children daily and recording your comments in the orange Reading Records Book on a daily basis. Please have fun with the books. Talk about the pictures and the story. Ask simple questions to gauge comprehension (in a fun way) and just enjoy the time with your children. It is a great way to settle children before bed and spend a little time with them before they go to sleep at night. If your child has brought home a phonics book or sheet, hear them read it everyday. This can also be recorded in the Reading Records Book Please remember to return Library books every FRIDAY.

## Y1 Update

Welcome back Year 1 and happy new year! We hope you had a lovely break and are ready for the new term ahead.

In **Maths** we have started the year by looking at time. We have been learning about months, the order of the months and how many there are. We know that there are 12 months in a year and to remember what month we are on we can use a calendar. Then, we focused on a day and the three different parts; morning, afternoon and evening. After speaking about the different activities that we do in a day, we sequenced a typical day and what it entails.

In **Writing** we have started the year with a new book called '**Mr Gumpy's Motor Car'.** Mr Gumpy and his friends all go for a drive. But when it starts to rain and the car gets stuck no one wants to get out and push. After giving their excuses, all of his friends eventually get out and push so that they can drive home and then go for a swim. After reading and enjoying the book, we sequenced the different parts of the story and then created a story map.

In Science, we have started our new topic **Amazing Animals**. In our first lesson, we learnt that there are many different types of animals which can be described in different ways. Animals are living things that eat, grow, breathe, reproduce, move, react, and get rid of waste. We played a game where we had to describe an animal and everyone else guessed what animal we were thinking about. Maybe you could try it at home too!

In History, we started our new topic **Travel and Transport.** We learnt that Transport is a vehicle that takes people or goods from one place to another. We can see different types of transport in our local area, such as cars, motorbikes and vans. Different types of transport are suitable for different journeys. We wouldn't take a helicopter to school, would we!

In **Phonics**, we have been learning these sounds. Please click on the sound and watch the video with your child.

## Y2 Update

In **Maths** lessons this week. We have begun a unit on Time, where the children have been consolidating their understanding of o'clock and half-past. It has been wonderful to see them engage with the concept and start to grasp how to tell the time on an analogue clock. This week, we've specifically concentrated on identifying intervals of 5, which is a crucial step in building their confidence with reading the time. Next week, we will be introducing the concepts of quarter past and quarter to, which will further enhance their understanding.We encourage you to spend some time over the weekend discussing these concepts with your child. Engaging in conversations about time can really help reinforce what they are learning in class and support their grasp of these important concepts.Additionally, I recommend visiting the website <u>here</u>. This resource offers fun and interactive problems that can enhance their learning and provide valuable practice with time-related challenges.

This week in **Writing** the pupils have been immersing themselves in a wealth of facts and information about our planet. We have taken the time to examine the various continents and oceans, which has sparked lively discussions and curiosity among the students. This exploration not only enhances their understanding of geography but also encourages a sense of global awareness that is essential for their development. We have been focusing on a range of language features, particularly the use of list sentences. The children are learning to utilise commas effectively to separate items in a list, which provides them with a more skilled way of constructing their sentences, rather than relying solely on the word "and."

In **Geography** we have started our Planet Earth topic, the pupils have been identifying the seven continents and where they are situated. Throughout our topic we will be exploring each continent and identifying the differences between each. In **Science** the pupils have started their new unit Living Things and Their habitats, we have been looking at what makes something living, dead or never lived.

## Y3 Update

Welcome back and a Happy New Year to everyone. It was nice to see the children come back and hear about what they did during the holidays. Year 3 has had a great start to Half-term 3!

In **Reading** this week, we have read a fact file about Ancient Egypt compiled from the BBC Bitesize website. The children answered retrieval and inference questions and we looked at the following vocabulary: **construction, preserved, structure** and **inspired.** We discussed their meaning, what word class they belong to and we used the words in a sentence of our own. We also looked at synonyms and antonyms for some of the words.

In **Mathematics**, we have started our new unit on multiplication and division. This week we have been looking at how arrays, Cuisenaire rods and bar models can represent multiplication and division calculations. We looked at word problems to use arrays, Cuisenaire rods and bar models to represent the maths in the word problems.

In **Writing**, we have started our new genre. This week we have been learning about the purpose of a setting description. We have been discussing what a setting is and how we can use our senses to describe different aspects of the setting such as what we can see, hear, touch and smell. The children worked on using prepositions and forming interesting expanded noun phrases to describe an ancient Egyptian pyramid.

In **Science**, we have started with our topic for this term, which is **Light and Shadows**. The children were introduced to key vocabulary such as darkness, brightness and light source. We discussed the difference between artificial and natural light sources and listed examples of light sources that we can find in the school. We also explored the dangers of being in the Sun for too long and what we can do to protect ourselves, such as wearing SPF.

Please continue to support your child by engaging with all of the online homework portals. They are required to achieve a minimum of **200 correct answers and points** on TTRS and Mathletics every week as well as complete a **quiz** on Accelerated Reader for their reading book once finished. Completing the weekly homework set has a direct impact on your child's learning at school.

## Y4 Update

Welcome back to all our Year 4s! We have had a wonderful start to the new term and cannot wait to continue learning in 2025.

In **Reading** this week, we have read the non-fiction text 'Amazon Rainforest Travel Guide'. Our six key vocabulary words have been: **immersed**, **pristine**, **communities**, **deforestation**, **endangered** and **remote**. During our lessons, we discussed the importance of non-fiction texts and answered retrieval questions from the extract using our new vocabulary. We also made a mindmap on why the Amazon is in danger.

In **Maths**, the children have been learning how to use the **short division** method. They have practiced dividing numbers by single-digit divisor, focusing on understanding remainders and the importance of place value. Pupils have used place value counters and place value charts to help build and develop their knowledge of division.

In **Writing** this half term, we are learning how to write informal letters! We learnt that the purpose of a letter is to inform, and compared it to other informational genres we've done such as biographies and recounts. We used activities such as taking visual notes, creating mindmaps and hot seating to understand the lives of Amazonian children, and put ourselves in their shoes.

In **Geography** this week, we launched our new unit: the Amazon! This term, we are tackling the enquiry question: what is the Amazon, why is it important and should it be protected? We know that the Amazon is in South America, and situated it on a map by comparing it to surrounding continents and oceans.

Please continue to support your children in completing their homework and encourage them to engage with our online platforms, **TTRS**, **Matheltics** and **Accelerated Reader (AR)**. Regular practice and engagement on these platforms will help reinforce their learning and build confidence.

## Y5 Update

Welcome back to HT3! The Year 5 Team hope you all had a restful and enjoyable Christmas break!

In **Reading,** we have been reading Everest, a biographical story of Tenzing Norgay and Edmund Hillary as the first people to climb to the top of Everest and a Travel guide of Volcanoes in Asia. Children analysed the use of persuasive language through rhetorical questioning, descriptive language and the use of impressive facts to further highlight the unique aspects of each volcano. Children then were able to successfully apply their retrieval skills to extract information from the non fiction extracts.

In **Maths**, we have spent this week consolidating learning on previous topics. We began the week looking back over long multiplication, multiplying 2,3 and 4 digit numbers by 2 digit numbers. We also spent time looking back over short division with and without remainders.

In **Writing**, we started our newest genre - a **persuasive letter**. Our aim is to persuade both Ms Sayed and Ms Copas to visit Thailand (Ms Sayed has friends over there, and Ms Copas is looking for an Easter getaway!). So, we started the week researching facts about Thailand and what makes it the perfect destination. Then, we looked at a few **persuasive techniques** we could use in our letter - **rhetorical question**, **alliteration** and **rule of three** were some of the features we discussed. Finally, we ended the week by analysing a model persuasive letter. Understanding what makes a persuasive letter effective. Stay tuned to find out whether Ms Sayed and Ms Copas jet off to Thailand.

This week in **Science**, we began our latest topic - **Properties of Materials**. We found out what it meant by a property of material (what it looks like and what it does). We even gave three examples of properties of materials (**transparent**, **opaque** and **translucent**). We conducted a small investigation where we looked in our own classrooms, searching for everyday items and recorded the object, material it was made from, whether it was **natural** or **synthetic** and its most useful properties. Following on from this, we conducted another investigation where we tested the **transparency** of four different materials (white paper, window, brick and tracing paper). Results indicated that no light passed through the brick, but some light passed through the tracing paper.

### Y6 Update

Welcome back Year 6 and Happy New Year! We hope you've had a restful break and an enjoyable Christmas Day, for those of you celebrating. Parents, please ensure that you book a Parents Evening slot on Arbor. Any questions please contact your class teacher.

This week in **Reading**, we have been reading a non-chronological report about World War 1. We focused on understanding the meaning of three key vocabulary: **hostile**, **inevitable** and **tension** and pupils completed activities to apply their understanding of them. We looked at three main sections which provided information on relationships and alliances between European countries, the naval arms race and the cause of the war. Pupils worked to summarise the key information from each section into their representation so they could visually retell it. Using this representation, pupils were able to be highly successful in answering retrieval and word meaning questions.

In **Mathematics**, we have moved on to our **Decimals and Measures unit**, where we have been reading different scales and units of measure. We progressed to answering questions on mass and money. As well as this we have revisited a couple of arithmetic topics such as using **known facts** to solve division and multiplication questions.

In Writing, we began our new topic focusing on a **Diary Entry (Recount).** As our topic in History for the next two terms is linked to the first and second world war, we began looking at life in the **Trenches** during **WW1.** Students had the opportunity to create a **conscience alley** and role played what life was like for an allied soldier in the trenches. Next week we begin our modelled write following a soldier just about to enter the trenches on the **Western Front**!

In **Science**, we have started with our new topic for this half-term, which is **'Evolution and Inheritance'**. In this first lesson, pupils were able to draw on their prior knowledge of fossils (a topic which they would have covered in Year 3) to discuss what a fossil is and where they can be found. We looked at key scientific vocabulary such as palaeontology and palaeontologists, who are the scientists that study fossils and the history of life on Earth. We also learnt about a famous fossil hunter named Mary Anning and how her discovery of the ichthyosaur was revolutionary in making scientists realise that some species can become extinct. Pupils then conducted an investigation by becoming palaeontologists who had to predict what the 4 fossils were of, where they might have lived, what they might have eaten and what species it reminds them of in today's world.

In **PSHE**, we have started with our new topic for this half-term, which is **Dreams and Goals** and heard from their own teachers about their goals, both academically and personally. Pupils drafted their goals by the end of this academic year and we will revisit their goals before the end of the academic year
